Water Supply Constantly Guarded

One of the most important branches of the work of the Board of Health is the monthly check on water used through district systems; regular analyses showed no upward infection or pollution. The samples are taken by the Board from all water supplied in the district and forwarded to Vancouver for examination regularly each month. This constant check-up is a little-known but highly important factor in the general health standard of the district, and the care with which it is carried out is justified in the absence of any major epidemics here for many years.
